European Perspectives is a **scientific journal** that publishes original, **peer-reviewed scientific articles** focusing on relevant political, sociological, social, security, economic and legal as well as ethnic, cross-ethnic, minority and cross-cultural issues related to European and Euro-Atlantic integration process.

European Perspectives covers a wide range of topics that are important for the countries of the Western Balkans on their way to the EU and form the basis of the accession negotiations (35 chapters). We also welcome papers focusing on regional integration processes especially in comparison with the Western Balkans or with experiences and lessons learned, useful for this purpose. The emphasis is also on promotion of young, not yet established authors.

According to the mission and outreach of the Publisher – the Institute IFIMES (Special Consultative Status with ECOSOC since 2018), the journal publishes also articles on topics from around the world, provided they contain a useful lesson for the region of the Western Balkans and its European path.

European Perspectives is an **open access** journal and does **not charge** readers or their institutions for access to the journal articles. The open access supports the rights of users to read, download, copy, distribute, print, search, or link to the full texts of these articles provided they are properly acknowledged and cited. There is **no article processing fee charged** to the authors and all articles are immediately available on the journal website once published. Permitted reuse is defined by the following user license: Creative Commons Attribution-NonCommercial-NoDerivatives ([CC BY-NC-ND](https://creativecommons.org/licenses/by-nc-nd/4.0/)). Journal is published twice a year.

European Perspectives reserves **the right to reject** any manuscript as being unsuitable in topic, style or form without requesting an external review.

All manuscripts are checked by referees by means of a **double-blind peer review**. Two external referees review each manuscript. Before the submission please note:

- All texts submitted to the journal **must be original works** of the author(s). By submitting a manuscript, the author(s) warrant(s) to the journal that it does not infringe the copyright or any other rights of third parties.
- The journal reviews received manuscripts on the assumption of **an exclusive submission**: by submitting a manuscript for consideration, the author(s) warrant(s) that it is not simultaneously being considered by any other publication and that it shall not be sent to another publication until a response is received from the journal.

The deadlines to submit articles are:

- **20 June 2023**: deadline for submitting abstracts (200 Words)
- **1 July 2023**: notification of acceptance
- **31 August 2023**: deadline for submitting full papers.

Brief guidelines for the authors

General	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - English, U.S. language version. - Times New Roman, single line spacing, font 12. - Left and right margins.
Length	- 6.000 – 9.000 words (including footnotes).
About the author	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - A brief biographical note about the author including previous and current institutional affiliation, email address. - If co-authored- provide information about all the authors.
Structure of the article	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Title, Abstract, Keywords, Introduction, Theoretical Framework - Additional titles/subtitles (do not use numbers), Conclusion, References - Avoid the enumeration in more lines in the text. If you have to use it than use – not bullets.
Title of the article	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Times New Roman, font 16, bold. - Maximum length is 15 words. - Title
Titles in the article	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Times New Roman, font 12, bold, caps lock, letters only. - Maximum length is up to 7 words. - TITLES
Subtitles	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Times New Roman, font 12, bold, italics. - Maximum length is up to 7 words. - SUBTITLES
Abstract	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 150-170 words, English. - It should be translated in Slovene.
Key words	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Maximum up to 6 words, English - Also Slovene translation.
Footnotes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Times New Roman, font 10. - Left and right margins.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Below are some most commonly used in text citations and references. - For more details and examples please see the following guidelines System of referencing and Quick Harvard Guide. 	
An author whole work	This view has been expressed by Cormack (1994).
Particular part of the work	<p>Cormack (1994, p.32) – p. for single page, and for range of pages Cormack (1994, pp.32-34) – pp.</p> <p>If you use the same work on the same page from the same author few times in a row: (ibid.)</p> <p>If you use the same work of the same author on a different page few times in a row: (ibid., p.32) or different pages: (ibid., pp.23-32).</p>
Work or piece of research without mentioning the author in the text	Making reference to publish work appears to be characteristic of writing for a professional audience (Cormack, 1994).
Table, diagrams	<p>The title of the table should be on the top of the table, below should be the source (if applicable) and finally add acknowledge where the table was found. Include the full details of the source in your reference list.</p> <p>Table 1: Television ownership in England and Wales (Percentage of households)</p> <p>Source: National Statistics Office</p> <p>National Statistics Office, 1985 cited in Brown, 2005, p.267.</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - All items should be listed alphabetically by author or authorship, regardless of the format. - For more books of the same author, list them chronologically, from the oldest to the newest. - If there are more books from the same author from the same year, distinct them with a, b c, after the year of publishing. - Below are some most commonly used references.
